







THE SCHOOL COUNSELORS' ROLE IN SUPPORTING STUDENTS AND THE SCHOOL COMMUNITY AFTER TRAGEDY

When a 16-year-old student was shot and killed by a 14-year-old near West Mesa High School in Albuquerque on Feb. 25, television crews captured the actions of the response team – school personnel, first responders and district and police administration. Behind the scenes were school counselors, social workers and support staff who are there to comfort, support, and, all too often, try to explain the unexplainable.

Counselors, we know you are there, and we stand by you.

The New Mexico Public Education Department, and those of us in the College and Career Readiness Bureau, are here to support your daily work, your professionalism, and the incredible job you do for students, parents, and even the school staff who may come to you for comfort amid an extreme tragedy. Know that you are appreciated every day.

For the counselors and staff at West Mesa High School, we send our deepest condolences for the loss of a student in your school family. For all the grief counselors, including contractors and others, who showed up in the days following the shooting to provide support, thank you.

School shootings, teen suicide, and addiction problems are situations that impact nearly every school and district. In Albuquerque, it was the second shooting death of a student in the last six months. It's the counselors who play a pivotal role in addressing grief for the entire school community.

Leslie Kelly, Behavioral Health Program Coordinator for the PED's Safe and Healthy Schools Bureau, said there are resources and places to go when you need emotional and mental health support.

"We all need help sometimes, especially when a student dies," said Kelly, also a longtime school counselor.

"Those can be dark times for everyone involved. It also is a time for the adult professionals to assess their own mental health after helping so many people cope with what has happened. This is no time to forget about your own health."

<u>The Education Support</u> website also has a list of resources to help you address everything from daily work stress, burnout, health, and well-being. The site gives practical strategies for working educators. One of the key pieces of advice for anybody who helps students, families, and others address grief is to take the time to talk to someone else about how you are feeling.

We all have a role to play in ensuring our schools remain a safe place for learning. Counselors are there when something traumatic interrupts the learning. Thank you for all you do behind the scenes - when the cameras aren't rolling and the important work begins.

TAKE TIME FOR A MOMENT OF MINDFULNESS: THE IMPORTANCE OF SILENCE

Sometimes five minutes of silence is enough to recover your calm, balance, and peace. As school counselors, your days are filled with sound, including the conversations you have with your students and colleagues. However, a brief moment away from the noise and the endless conversations and suddenly our brain starts to work on another level. As numerous studies reveal, human beings also need silence to create new connections and brain cells.

<u>Exploring Your Mind</u> is a website that provides guided techniques to help professionals take a mindful approach to addressing stress in their jobs. Take a moment to see what five minutes of silence can do for your brain.







FEBRUARY 23 COUNSELORS' COMMUNITY VIRTUAL CONFERENCE RECAP

ECHO FOR SOUTHWEST COLLEGE AND CAREER COUNSELING FOCUSES ON RURAL AND UNDERSERVED SOUTHWEST COMMUNITIES

Southwest College and Career Counseling (SWCCC), a program of Project ECHO® at the University of New Mexico, is a virtual professional development opportunity for educators and counselors in rural and underserved Southwest communities involved in college and career pathway planning for students.

SWCCC is designed for educators who:

- Engage in college and career counseling, especially those at high schools with **significant Native American enrollment**
- Will commit to the duration of the program and implement strategies learned in the professional practice to the extent possible
- Serve **rural and underserved communities** in New Mexico and Oklahoma.

The program connects educators with a community of learning made up of other professionals in the field. It also:

- Engages educators in expert led workshops
- Connects them with evidence-based resources and best-practices
- Provides case-based learning to develop solutions to relevant dilemmas of practice

Virtual sessions are bi-weekly, lasting 60-minutes each. Additionally, there is immersion training for all participants, who are expected to attend all sessions. The sessions and topics are aligned to the school calendar to make them as useful as possible. Upon completion of program requirements, participants will receive a stipend of \$500.
