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New Mexico Counselors Attend Career Development Workshop in June

More than 30 New Mexico counselors virtually attended the recent Advance CTE workshop, "Empowering Students through Career Technical Education (CTE) and Career Advising." The workshops were hosted by the New Mexico Public Education Department's College and Career Readiness Bureau and presented by Advance CTE.

The two half-day sessions provided school counselors and other advising professionals with the information and resources they need to connect students with opportunities aligned with their career passions and goals. Participants came away with an enhanced knowledge of the full range of education and career options, with a specific focus on Career Technical Education (CTE) and in-demand occupations, to empower students to skillfully navigate their path to career and college success as well as expand their existing strategies for effective career advisement.

The main objectives of the workshop were to:

- Identify and discuss the various components and benefits of a high-quality CTE program of study, including work-based learning, industry-recognized credentials and dual/concurrent credit;
- Discuss the range of options available in CTE along with current workforce trends and know how to access information on CTE programs and the labor market;



TAILORED CAREER EXPLORATION WITH PATHWAY2CAREERS

362 SCHOOL COUNSELORS ON THE PANDEMIC'S EFFECT ON CHILDREN: 'ANXIETY IS FILLING OUR KIDS'

In an April 2022 nationwide survey by the *New York Times*, school counselors said students are behind in their abilities to learn, cope and relate. According to a recent article by Claire Cain Miller and Bianca Pallaro summarizing the survey, "American schoolchildren's learning loss in the pandemic isn't just <u>in reading and math</u>. It's also in social and emotional skills — those needed to make and keep friends; participate in group projects; and cope with frustration and other emotions."

'Kids have the highest level of anxiety l've ever seen: anxiety about basic safety and fear of what could happen.' -Susan Julien, Fall River Elementary School, Longmont, Colorado

The article goes on to say, "the counselors — licensed educators who <u>teach these skills</u> — described many students as frozen, socially and emotionally, at the age they were when the pandemic started."

"Something that we continuously come back to is that our ninth graders were sixth graders the last time they had a normative, uninterrupted school year," said Jennifer Fine, a high school counselor in Chicago. "Developmentally, our students have skipped over crucial years of social and emotional development."

Nearly all counselors reported their students were showing more signs of anxiety and depression than before the pandemic and that students were having more trouble regulating their emotions and solving conflicts with friends.
